

# Mind the App: Britain's Older Generation vs Technology

In homes across the UK, a mighty battle is raging. It involves determination, confusion, mild panic, and at least one person shouting, "Why has it disappeared? I only pressed ONE BUTTON!" Yes, it's older people taking on modern tech — and somehow, winning.

Let's talk numbers. A national report shows that 4.7 million over-65s struggle with basic online tasks, including turning devices on, logging in, and knowing which password goes with which account — a challenge only slightly easier than assembling IKEA furniture blindfolded. Even better, around 2.3 million older people don't use the internet at all, and nearly half of them are over 75. If the digital world were a nightclub, this group has taken one look at the bouncers (Wi-Fi and two-factor authentication) and said, "No thanks, love, I'm going home."

And yet — tech use among older people is booming. Millions are now online, many regularly video-calling relatives, sending WhatsApps, and googling questions like "Is it dangerous if a dog eats a sock?" Age UK notes that older people are enthusiastically browsing, emailing, shopping, and banking online — presumably with the same intensity they once reserved for queueing at the Post Office. Tablets are especially popular with the 65+ crowd, proving once and for all that the iPad is basically the new crossword book.



Then there's the tech designed especially for them. Devices like the GrandPad — built for simplicity and featuring a more responsive touchscreen — are becoming a hit. It's essentially a tablet that says, "Don't worry, you can't break me," which is precisely the energy older Brits appreciate.

Yet perhaps the greatest joy comes from the unexpected adventures technology inspires. Take the grandparent who tried to order groceries by speaking directly to the microwave. Or the older gentleman who asked Alexa to "stop interrupting" because she kept answering questions he was asking the dog. Or the WhatsApp group where one person's thumb sends 47 close-up photos to everyone at 2am.

But the benefits are undeniable. Tech keeps people connected, safe, entertained, and independent. It allows older adults to get medical advice, video-chat loved ones, and occasionally — accidentally — order 24 jars of marmalade.



Sure, some digital platforms aren't designed with older users in mind. And yes, a third of older adults risk being left behind in an increasingly online world. But the direction of travel is clear: Britain's seniors are conquering the digital frontier one baffling pop-up message at a time.

So the next time you're summoned to help fix the Wi-Fi, don't sigh — you are witnessing history. This is the Great British Digital Revolution of the Older Generation. It's glorious, unpredictable, and slightly chaotic. Just like the nation itself.

## Looking for a new challenge in 2026 become an Independent Monitor

- **Do you care about what goes on behind locked doors?**
- **Do you believe everyone should be treated fairly and humanely?**

If so, this could be the perfect opportunity for you.

The Independent Monitoring Boards (IMB) are recruiting volunteers across the UK. IMB members are ordinary people doing an extraordinary role: monitoring the treatment and conditions of people in custody and ensuring standards of fairness and decency.

As an IMB volunteer, you'll have unique access to prisons and immigration detention centres, speaking to those in custody and staff, observing daily life, and reporting on what you find. It's a role that offers insight into a world few people see – and the chance to make a real difference.

What's involved?

- **Around 2–3 visits per month**
- **Talking to people in custody and staff**
- **Monitoring conditions and treatment**
- **Working as part of a supportive team**

What we're looking for:

- **Integrity, honesty, and objectivity**
- **Good communication skills**
- **A commitment to fairness, equality, and inclusion**
- **People who want to use their time to help others**

You don't need previous experience – full training and mentoring are provided. We welcome volunteers from all walks of life. You just need to be over 18 and live within 30 miles of the prison or detention centre you'll monitor.

Although this is an unpaid role, we cover travel and subsistence expenses, childcare/carer costs, and, in some cases, contributions towards loss of earnings.



### Recruitment campaign now open!

Join our team of ordinary people doing an extraordinary role: independent monitors in prisons and immigration detention.
